
Unit: DANS MA VILLE

Unit Objective: To remember and recall from memory 7 places from the town in French.

#### By the end of this unit, we will be able to:

- Recognise, recall, and remember up to 7 places from the town in French.
- Attempt to spell some of these nouns with their correct indefinite article/determiner.
- Attempt to build a sentence using the structure 'il y a' (there is) plus the noun and the correct indefinite article/determiner.

## Skills we will develop:



### Activities we will complete:

A lot of tasks to help us learn to listen more carefully in French. Repeating the words and short phrases each lesson to ensure we can remember all the new words and language presented to us. Remembering and recalling more easily and with more confidence each lesson. Helping to improve our memory skills and linguistic competence.

## Vocabulary we will learn & revisit:

The seven nouns for places in the town plus their appropriate indefinite article/determiner. Structure of 'il y a' (there is) in a sentence with the nouns.

# It will help if we already know:

• Vocabulary from the **Salutations** unit and ideally **Transport** and/or **Under the** sea.

### Phonics & pronunciation we will see:

- ON nasal sound in Bonjour
- OU sound in boulangerie



• **Guttural 'R'.** Becoming more familiar with the French 'r' sound as seen in **boulangerie** and **(jus d') orange**. Beginning to notice that this sound is made from the back of the mouth, not the front. Different to the 'r' sound in English!

Even if we do not see these letters and sounds in the lessons often, we will hear these signature French sounds many times as they appear in key words in this unit.

#### Grammar we will learn & revisit:

**Nouns & articles/determiners.** We will start to notice that in French there are often more options for single words like determiners than in English. For example, as seen with the word for 'a' in French. <u>Un cinéma</u> (a cinema) but <u>une</u> école (a school). We will see that this happens a lot in French and learn why in future units!
