Keeping Well and Clean

Learn that things people put into their bodies can affect how they feel, why hygiene is important and how simple hygiene routines can stop germs from being passed on, how physical activity and healthy eating helps them to stay healthy, what they can do to take care of themselves daily, e.g. brushing teeth and hair, hand washing, and who helps help them to stay healthy (e.g. parent, dentist, doctor).

An algorithm is a sequence of steps, instructions or rules that is used to perform a specific task. Algorithms can be followed by people or digital equipment. For algorithms to achieve the end goal, instructions must be accurate and followed sequentially. Mistakes are called bugs and finding and fixing them is called debugging.

Observe and explore outcomes when blocks are put in sequences and identify and debug a simple algorithm.
