St Catherine's Catholic School are a Gold Rights Respecting School. They achieved Gold in April 2018. Gold is the highest stage of the Rights Respecting Schools Award. Achieving 'Gold: Rights Respecting' means there is evidence that:

The school has explicitly adopted a child rights approach based on the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child and has embedded it in school policy, practice and culture

Children, young people and adults have a thorough understanding of child rights, and rights respecting attitudes and language are embedded across the school

RRSA has had a positive impact on children and young people's learning and wellbeing Students see themselves as rights respecting global citizens and are advocates for social justice, fairness and children's rights at home and abroad

Speaker 1: Gaia

Hello my name is Gaia. As well as being a Rights Respecting Ambassador I am a Fundraising House Captain for Michael.

One of our strengths as a Gold RRS is that the children's voice is valued from the time the start Nursery.

We have RRS Ambassadors, House Captains, Sports Captains... everyone has a voice and a right to be listened to.

Our journey as a Rights Respecting School began in March 2015. In 2016 we were awarded the Level 1 Rights respecting status. Our Assessor was Gillian Roberts.

In our last Ofsted Inspection we were judged as outstanding.

Our Rights Respecting Leader is Mrs Ainger. She is lovely and wants us to keep trying to be the best school we can be!

Finally after two year of trying our VERY best we were awarded the Rights respecting Gold Award. This was awarded in April 2018. Our assessor was Paul Harris.

Most schools would stop here but NOT us!

We visited a nearby school called Martins School to chat about being a Gold award School and how we could work together. They are visiting our school in September.

We do not see this as a competition. We see this as a way to teach others.

This has made an impact on my own life by showing me that you can do anything if you try.

You can be the worst and become the best just by trying and having a growth mindset.

Speaker 2: Johnny

Good Afternoon my name is Johhny. As well as being a Rights respecting ambassador I am also a Science ambassador.

Our work and determination has placed the UN Convention on the Rights of the child at the heart of every child in our school. This has created a great impact that has drastically improved the well-being and development of every child's talents and abilities. As Gaia said we encourage all to have a GROWTH mind-set.

One of the many ways this happens is through Talk Partners. They demonstrate our respect for one another and the significance of listening and respecting the views of one another.

Observations and assessments by our headteacher, the leadership team and governors have also displayed this constantly as well as how we use our mistakes and each other as vital learning resources.

We have also all agreed on our behaviour system which has impacted positively on our learning behaviours inside and outside school. 'Every child has a right to an education'.

St Catherine's School strives to create a diverse community in which all members are safe, respected and valued. We believe that in actively promoting a diverse learning environment, we are fostering intellectual, social and emotional growth for all.

We aspire to a celebration of the varied appearances, abilities, perspectives and values that characterize our community. Everyone has a voice.

We are continuously organising fundraising events, raising awareness and responding to global issues that arise. Recently our group held a trade fair and the monies raised were donated to Noah's Ark Hospice and FSSA Zambia- showing how we reach out locally and globally.

At our school there is a serious zero tolerance and any form of bullying and regularly have discussions about this matter; encouraging children tell a member of staff if we ever have concerns.

Speaker 3 Kimmianne

Hello, my name is Kimmianne Davis. I have been a Rights Respecting Ambassador for 3 years since year 4.

So what makes St Catherine's so special?

We, as a Rights Respecting school, have class charters in every classroom and in key areas around the school- the main hall, entrance, dining hall and playground. The Class charters in every classroom are designed by the children in September and show that every child has the rights of a child from the day they are born.

As Johnny said we also have very visual behaviour charts. Our Behaviour charts include a reminder, warning and time out. Children own their behaviour and everyone has the right to learn. Every class also has a large star which is a way of rewarding good behaviour.

Every month we have a new Theme of the Month and an Article of the month which are linked. This month our theme is Friendship and our article is article 15- every child has the right to meet with other children and young people and to join groups and organisation as long as this does not stop people from enjoying their rights.

When School Advisers, Governors and new parents come to look around our school they instantly find evidence to show why we are a Gold Rights Respecting School such as the way the children behave- eager to learn and happy in the classroom environment.

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At St Catherine's we also believe in the Children's Voice. We have House Captains, Sports Captains, and Fundraising Captains, a School Council, science Ambassadors, Junior Road Safety Officers, Prefects and so many other ways. We are listened to!

Hello! My name is Charlotte and I've been a Rights Respecting Ambassador for three years. In 2016 we received our Level 1 Award and since then we have been working non-stop to be the best we can be!
